From Pastor Bill

he season of Lent is a chance to spend time thinking more reflectively about who we are and how God's Spirit is moving in our lives. Jesus' ministry began with a period of solitude. Forty days he spent in the desert "being tempted by Satan." But what really is "Satan?" That's the name given to

those forces in our lives that call us away from our true selves. Literally, the

word means "tempter." And

there are innumerable voices calling us every day: calling us to indulge our egos, calling us to rely on our own power, calling us to pursue success and status and security. These 40 days can be a time to stop; a time to listen deeply; a time to rest from the frenzy of consumption.

That's why during our Lenten study time this year we are learning to meditate in the Buddhist tradition. Our tradition has largely lost its hold on meditation. We've forgotten how to focus. Our minds are filled with needless anxieties and when it's quiet the voices invade us. It takes training to silence those voices. It takes practice to cultivate an attitude of loving kindness and compassion.

Our time together began on Tuesday, February 24th, and will continue each Tuesday until Holy Week. You may not be able to attend every session, but I hope you will attend at least one. Don't let the Buddhist origin keep you away; we have much to learn from the wisdom of other traditions. And when we do, I think you'll find their deepest wisdom sounds a lot like ours. More and more I'm discovering that all wisdom is rooted in the same Source; our various religions are interpretive frameworks for

understanding the same Truth. It's when we mistake the religion (our small truths) for the Truth that we lose our way. As our Lord said, "You will know the truth, and the truth will make you free."

Let this season of Lent be a time for you to begin a journey of discovery; a time when you can put aside anxiety and fear to walk anew in the light of Truth. Let the Source of all life speak to you from the deepest recesses of your spirit and lead you to your truest self, revealed in the Risen Lord.

Life-giving Wells, for the Celts and Us

When have you felt left out or rejected? Who gave you the gift of life when you needed it? In a fit of jealousy, Sarah asked Abraham to get rid of Hagar and her son Ishmael. He sent them to the desert with not much food and water. When supplies ran

out, Hagar was angry with God. Then she heard God's gentle and reassuring voice in her heart. Appearing

before her,

she saw a
well right there in the
desert. Then she and her
son knew they belonged to

God. (Genesis 21:8-21)

Was there a time you were given refreshment and, in turn, passed the gift to another? David, in the midst of a conflict, felt a craving and said, "Who will give me a drink of water from the well by the gate of Bethlehem?" Three men wishing to fulfill his wish broke through the

Philistines' camp, drew water from the well, and gave it to the king. However, David did not drink the water but poured it out as a gift to God because the men had risked their lives for it. (2 Samuel 23:13-17)

Were you ever rescued from a dark place and given new life? Joseph was given a fancy coat by his father, was thrown in a well by his jealous, angry brothers, and then sold as a slave to Egyptians. There he found favor with Pharoah, who charged him with storing food for a famine. Later, his brothers and sisters had little to eat and went to Egypt for food. They met Joseph who, seeing they were sorry for what they had done to him, provided them with food and a place to live.

Gracious Gift-giver, open our eyes to see wells of blessing around us. Renewing Presence, thank you for the new life you offer. Dearly Beloved, thank you for the great blessings you pour over us.

Wells for the Celts were a source of water, assurance of life itself, a cradle of new birth and a source of everything living. The journey into the depths of the well required courage and risk to reach the living water, which they thought was mysterious

as it came from unseen realms.

Today in symbolic terms, a well is a pathway between surface and depth. It is a link between our conscious daily existence and our subconscious life. It is a source of life and hope that will not dry up because it comes from the ground water of our being.

By sojourning at wells, one can reconnect with nature and the water that flows through the body of the earth, our mother. One could also consider a well with its dark space as that of a life-giving womb birthing new life.

During this reflective time of Lent you are invited to read more stories about life-giving wells and view beautiful banners designed and painted by Mary Mohlke, North's artist-in-residence, and director of the resource center, which is in the south wing of the church. These lovely banners are displayed in the chapel in the south wing. Come, reflect, be renewed.



Update on Online Giving

Late last year, the Session, at the recommendation of the Finance Committee and Generosity Team, approved a contract for online giving. That is now being implemented through our website. With this new feature, you will be able to make a one-time or recurring gift using a credit card or a bank transfer. You will be hearing more about this when it is up and running.

"What's Your Stake in the Youth & Children's Ministry?"

That's a question our special Task Force (that's been meeting to assess and vision for our youth and children's ministry) wants to ask the congregation of North Presbyterian Church (NPC).

Jesus said to his disciples that all children should come to him, "because the kingdom belongs to such as these." But what does it mean to bring our children to Jesus? Moreover, what does this specific congregation expect from this ministry, what can the average congregant give to it, and what should youth and children's ministry even look like, or mean?

The following is a mission and vision statement that has been approved by Session:

• The mission of Children's/Youth Ministry is to create and sustain an environment within NPC that will provide the knowledge and experiences necessary for children and youth to understand God's love in a way that they will seek to emulate it. We aspire to accomplish this as we are called to do by our Lord Jesus Christ so that our youth possess a moral foundation upon which they can rely as they make difficult choices in an imperfect world.

 Our vision: Every child follows Christ.

Defining our mission and vision is an important first step and one we believe honors Jesus' sentiment of welcoming children and ministering to them. Yet we are still left with these critical questions that every congregation of Jesus, including ours, should be asking itself. There will be several opportunities during March and April for folks to sit down with members from this task force and share their mind, ponder where they can be a part of this mission and vision, and answer some questions that should be thought-provoking and beneficial for all. *On* Wednesday, March 4, at **7:00pm**, we invite you to be part of the "New Ideas" meeting scheduled in the chapel. Folks have been meeting to generate ideas about new ways to worship and reach out to each other and the community. At this meeting, we will schedule an upcoming meeting to specifically discuss youth & children's ministry.

Also, save the date of Sunday, April 19, when we will host two exciting

opportunities, one at 10:45am during church school for children, and one from noon to 1:30pm for parents. Both of these times will be opportunities to offer feedback on youth & children programming.

This is a crucial stage for our youth ministry. Volunteer hours for these ministries are at an all-time low, the local school districts and community youth activities continue to compete for our young people's time, the family as a whole is busier than ever before, and Peter Martin is seeking an ordained call away from the congregation. Please set aside time to attend one of these meetings to help figure out together how to best serve our children, youth, and families of this congregation, prepare for the future, and honor our Lord Jesus' spirit of welcoming and loving our young people.



Empower Others through One Great Hour of Sharing

In 1949, churches in the United States made appeals for the relief and reconstruction of areas devastated in World War II. The next year, the appeal was repeated using the name

"One Great Hour of Sharing." One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) continues as a Christian effort to empower, provide water, supply food, and give relief from disasters.



The funds collected are commonly split into thirds, with one third going to support disaster assistance; one third going to support self-development programs and one third going to support hunger relief. Throughout the world, the gap between those who have enough and those who don't continues to widen. In order to help make a difference in the lives of others, this special collection will be received at North Church on March 29.

The children will receive their fish banks on Sunday, March 1, and you are encouraged to talk with them about the ways we can share with those in need. **Please help them remember to return the banks on March 29**. When you give to OGHS you are assisting in the empowerment of others as they move past emotional, physical, and spiritual misfortune. Your help gives hope.

What Happened at Session?

The regular meeting of the Session on February 2 was postponed to Monday, February 9, 2015, due to the stormy weather. At that meeting, the following actions were taken:

- Approved the action item from the Finance
 Committee regarding the new online giving Privacy
 Policy, which will appear on our website, as
 required by our agreement with EFT.
- On a motion from Elder Lee Broad, it was voted to refer a suggested template for reporting fund balances to the Finance Committee for its input and to report back to the Session in the two months.
- Approved youth participation on February 17, 2015, at the Urban Diner.
- Approved the action item from the Property
 Committee requesting the purchase of two new
 standard refrigerators to replace the commercial
 refrigerator currently in use, with the cost to come
 from the Fixed Asset Reserve Account.
- Voted to dismiss the Task Group on sanctuary renovation with the thanks of the Session.
- Approved the mission and vision statements from the Children & Youth Ministry Task Force.


MORNING, 10:00am, LIBRARY

March 18: Glass, cold, sound, clean, time, and light. In Steven Johnson's book, *How We Got to Now,* (2014) he identifies these objects as the "six" innovations that made the modern world." The author explores the history of innovation over centuries, tracing facets of modern life (e.g., refrigeration, clocks, and Wi-Fi and Bluetooth) from their creation to their unintended historical consequences.

April 15: The Boys on the Boat: Nine Americans and Their Epic Quest for Gold at the 1936 Berlin Olympics (2014) by Daniel James Brown is set during the Great Depression, when an eight-oar crew, largely composed of individuals from dairy farms, lumber towns, and coastal villages of the Pacific Northwest, traveled to Berlin to challenge Hitler's feared racers.

AFTERNOON, 1:00PM, LIBRARY

March 25: *The Paris Architect* by Charles Belfoure. In 1942 Paris, gifted architect Lucien Bernard accepts a commission



that will bring him a great deal of money—and maybe get him killed. But if he's clever enough, he'll avoid any trouble. All he has to do is design a secret hiding place for a wealthy Jewish man, a space so invisible that even the most determined German officer won't find it. He sorely needs the money, and outwitting the Nazis who have occupied his beloved city is a challenge he can't resist. But when one of his hiding spaces fails horribly, and the problem of where to hide a Jew becomes terribly

personal, Lucien can no longer ignore what's at stake. *The Paris Architect* asks us to consider what we owe each other and just how far we'll go to make things right.

- Blankets, tents, food and other emergency supplies in the wake of a disaster
- Tools and seeds for refugees returning home to replant their fields
- Wells for families living in drought-prone areas to provide clean, safe water to drink and to irrigate crops and gardens
- Literacy training and microcredit for women struggling to realize their potential.

The last few years have confronted CWS with increased demands on their resources. Please give generously on Sunday, March 22, and Palm Sunday, March 29.
