think fall is my favorite season of the year. I love how the temperatures drop at night and the mornings are crisp, only to have them rise a bit during the day so it's comfortable to take a long walk or go on a bike ride. As the trees begin to turn, I'm always astonished by how vivid the colors can be, how beautiful it all is.

Two poems come to mind for me this time of year. One by Gerard Manley Hopkins, that I refer to often, is titled "God's Grandeur" and extols the amazing resilience of the earth in spite of all the things we do to despoil it. "The world is charged with the grandeur of God," Hopkins writes. It's this time of year that I see that grandeur on display. And even though we often fail to notice, or as Hopkins asks: "Why do men then now not reck his rod?" Why don't we comprehend the measure of God around us and appreciate God's presence in the turning seasons? We are blind too often to so much that could astonish us.

Another poem that comes to mind for me this time of year is by e.e.cummings. It starts: "i thank You God for most this amazing/ day: for the leaping greenly spirits of trees/and a blue true dream of sky; and for everything/which is natural which is infinite which is yes". Such poetry expresses my experience of creation much better than my own words. Fall is a time of wonder and renewal for me, even though it

may seem as if things are beginning to move into hibernation there is a vibrancy, an electricity in the air I find invigorating.

As we enter this new season, I encourage you to pay attention to the changes going on around us. Breathe deeply as the air chills. Take time to wander along hiking trails and country roads. Let the earth feed your soul as you bathe in its beauty. And be grateful. Every day offers new wonders to be discovered. Seek them out! Discover God's grace revealed in creation and give thanks. And if you happen to come across a poem that speaks to your heart, please share it with us. Perhaps we can discover together a renewed appreciation for God's goodness.

Harvest Moon

he first full moon closest to the autumn equinox is called a Harvest Moon. If you were watching the skies over the past weekend, you most likely noticed that bright orb in the sky. So what's so special about a Harvest Moon? Why does it look bigger or sometimes even orange in color when it rises?

The simple answer is the daylight hours are getting shorter. The moon rises close to sunset so when the moon rises close to an autumn equinox, it's doing so closer to sunset. After sunset around the time of any full moon, the moon will always be near the horizon. It'll have just risen. It's the location of the moon near the horizon that causes the Harvest Moon – or any full moon – to look big and orange in color. And because the moon's orbit around the Earth is not a perfect circle, there are times when the moon is actually closer to the Earth.

In the days before tractor lights, the light of the Harvest Moon helped farmers gather their crops despite the diminishing daylight hours. As the sun's light faded in the west, the moon would soon rise in the east to illuminate the fields throughout the night. The name was popularized in the early 20th century by the song below.

Shine on, shine on harvest moon

Up in the sky,
I ain't had no lovin'
Since January, February, June or July
Snow time ain't no time to stay
Outdoors and spoon,
So shine on, shine on harvest moon,

One of the newest groups to rent and share space at North Church is the Niagara Frontier Chord Authority (NFCA), a chapter of Harmony, Inc.



The NFCA was established in 1985 and is the only chapter of Harmony, Inc. in WNY. Under the direction of Ron Mason and Carol Zeffiro, the NFCA has received numerous awards and recognition. A portion of their annual performance proceeds are directed to community service organizations chosen by the members.

The NFCA practices in Westminster Hall every Thursday evening from 6-9 p.m. from September through March and we hope to host their annual concert later this year.



It's a daughter's testimony of holding on to hope more than 2,000 miles away. These two enter the fight of their lives—to restore that which had been stolen from them.

Advocacy and Outreach

Greetings from the A&O committee. We planned a dinner outing in lieu of our August meeting with the goal to support the WEDI Food Bazaar. We were disappointed upon arrival to discover they'd changed their summer hours and were closed. We ended up having a lovely meal at the Liberty Hound on the waterfront.

In support of our Mathew 25 initiative, the A&O committee is sponsoring the Walk of Abraham on October 11 and mailing of the NPC Task Force Vital Congregations questionnaire.

Our next special offering, the Peace and Global Witness Offering, will be collected on World Communion Sunday, the first Sunday in October. This offering enables the church to promote peace by addressing conflict and injustice around the world. The denomination recommends the offering be divided into three parts: 25% is to be used by North to address a locally designated need and another 25% designated by the Presbytery for supporting ministries of peace and reconciliation. The remaining 50% is to be used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice

through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness. Journey's End will be our locally designated charity for this offering.

IN A NUTSHELL: The August 2023 actual year to date results reflect a surplus of \$9,129. Total income is higher than total expenses by this amount. By comparison, the August 2023 year to date budget is a deficit of \$12,392.

On the income side, all line items are higher than budget with the exception of rental income. As reported in the previous update, rental income is lower than budget primarily due to a one-time adjustment credited to LE3 for overpayments made in 2022. Note the 3 summer BBQ fundraisers netted

\$4,616 after expenses, surpassing our total year budget of \$1,500. Many thanks to all our volunteers and those who supported the BBQ dinners!

On the expense side, most line items were less than budget or only slightly higher. Building/property was the notable exception, primarily due to the garage repair (\$2,000 insurance deductible).

We are grateful to be in a surplus position through August yet note that timing of donations and major expenses can impact financial results throughout the year.

We continue to be deeply appreciative of your financial support to the life and ministry of North Church.

Proceeds from the sales will help fill the gap in this year's budget.

October 29, 2023 The Peace Pole

How many of you have ever noticed the Peace Pole in our front yard? (Hint: it's behind the pine trees!) If you look closely, the words *May Peace Prevail on Earth* are displayed on three sides in English, Hebrew, and Arabic.



What is a Peace Pole? A Peace Pole is an internationally-recognized symbol of the hopes and dreams of the entire human family, standing vigil in silent prayer for peace on earth. Each Peace Pole bears the message *May Peace Prevail on Earth* in different languages on each of its four or six sides. There are estimated over 250,000 Peace Poles in

every country in the world dedicated as monuments to peace.

Planting a Peace Pole is a way of bringing people together to inspire, awaken and uplift the human consciousness the world over. It is a wonderful project for any community, organization, or your home. Peace Poles are now recognized as the most prominent international symbol and monument to peace. They remind us to think, speak and act in the spirit of peace and harmony. Stand as a silent visual for peace to prevail on earth.

At the intergenerational event on October 29, which will take place in Westminster Hall immediately following the worship service, we will visit our Peace Pole, place some flowers, and take some pictures. We will then register our Peace Pole on the May Peace Prevail On Earth International website. The children will make their own peace pole for their desk. Lunch will be served, and we hope to have international comfort food at our table for all to enjoy with skippy cups for dessert!
